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KSA LEGISLATIVE REPORT FOR WEEK ENDING JAN. 15 THE BIG NEWS

After meeting three days this past week, the General Assembly has recessed until Feb. 2. The House and Senate did pass separate versions of the budget, with differences in the plans to be worked out by conference committees. Action on bills has been limited and none of the bills KSA is backing, opposing, remaining neutral on or monitoring have been heard in committee.

As in past years, this report will be issued weekly during the session. KACO's Legislative Committee is scheduled to meet this week, to review legislation and vote on positions – support, oppose, neutral or monitoring - for legislation, including those impacting law enforcement and Sheriff's Offices.

BUDGET UPDATE

Unfortunately, and as expected, neither the House nor Senate versions of the budget included the \$600 per year KLEFPF increase that Gov. Andy Beshear proposed in his spending plan. KSA's legislative team does plan to approach legislators who are crafting the final spending plan about including the increase in the final budget passed by the General Assembly. However, we may have to wait until the 2022 session until we can work to include the increase in the next two-year spending plan.

LEGISLATION UPDATE

As in past sessions, each week this report will include updates on the bills KSA is supporting, opposing, and remaining neutral on and monitoring. The KSA legislative team and committee are still working through bills, which are being filed as a brisk pace, and determining KSA's stance on various pieces of legislation. A full list of KSA positions on legislation will be shared prior to the legislature returning to Frankfort on Feb. 2

Here are some initial bills KSA is following:

HOUSE

HB21: Breonna's law

Sponsored by Rep. Attica Scott, D-Louisville, the bill is an omnibus law enforcement reform bill that includes no knock warrants, body cam regulations and more. **Neutral**.

HB120: Fire mergers/tax collection fees

Sponsored by Rep. Ed Massey, R-Hebron, the bill was filed to allow fire departments in Boone County merge, though under the bill departments in other parts of the state could use it as well to merge. However, the bill includes the unintended consequence of limiting the percentage of fees sheriffs' departments could receive for collecting the tax. KSA Exec Dir Jerry Wagner has reached out to the Boone County Judge executive, whose office is working on the bill with Rep. Massey, to make the necessary changes.

Monitoring

HB136: Medical cannabis

Sponsored by Rep. Jason Nemes, R-Louisville, allows for the use of and regulates medical cannabis. **Monitoring**

HB138: Vehicle cosmetic damage; fee collection

Sponsored by Rep. Myron Dossett, R-Pembroke, the bill deals with "cosmetic damage" titles for motor vehicles that have received cosmetic damage only. A person seeking to have a title of a vehicle branded for having cosmetic damage only - such as from hail -

shall have the vehicle inspected by the local sheriff. They shall submit to the sheriff a statement from the person's insurance company documenting that the cosmetic damage exceeds 75% of the retail value of the vehicle and that the damage is solely the result of hail or other cosmetic only damage. Upon completion of the inspection, the sheriff shall certify on a vehicle transaction record that he or she has received the statement from the person's insurance company, that the damage to the vehicle is the result of hail or other cosmetic damage and if the total estimated or actual cost of parts and labor to rebuild or reconstruct the vehicle to its pre-cosmetic damage condition exceeds 75% of the retail value of the vehicle. The sheriff shall be paid a fee of \$5 to conduct the inspection.

Neutral

HB139: Line of duty benefit increase

Sponsored by Rep. John Blanton, the bill increases line of duty-related disability benefits. **Support**

HB164: Increases penalties for crimes against law enforcement officers

Sponsored by Rep. Regina Huff, R-Williamsburg, the bill creates a mandatory fine of \$5,000 for a person convicted of intentionally causing a peace officer to come into contact with communicable body fluid. **Monitoring**

HB189: School bus safety

Sponsored by Rep. David Hale, R-Wellington, the bill allows counties to enact legislation permitting local school districts to purchase stop-arm cameras. The cameras capture stop-arm violations by motorists and tag photos of the incident with details such as date, time and GPS coordinates that can be referred to law enforcement. **Neutral**

HB242: Prevents sanctuary cities

Sponsored by Rep. Lynn Bechler, R-Marion, the bill would forbid a local government from enacting or adopting sanctuary policies and prohibit those local governments that do so from receiving any money administered by a state agency or department until any such policy is repealed or no longer in effect. **Monitoring**

HB252: Pension income exclusion

Sponsored by Rep. Regina Huff, R-Williamsburg, the bill would increase the pension income exclusion from \$31,110 to \$41,110, retroactive for taxable years after Jan. 1,

2018. Support

SENATE

SB 80 The "Decert" bill

Sponsored by Sen. Danny Carroll, R-Paducah, the bill has been assigned to the <u>Senate Veterans</u>, <u>Military Affairs and Public Protection Committee</u>. The bill strengthens Kentucky's decertification process for law enforcement officers. Rep. John Blanton, R-Salyersville, also a retired law enforcement officer, will help carry the bill in the House.

Support

SB92: Medical cannabis

Sponsored by Sen. Stephen West, R-Paris, allows for the use of and regulates medical cannabis. **Monitoring**

SB104: Constable training

Filed by Sen. Robby Mills, R-Henderson, the bill establishes training and certification for constables. **Monitoring**

KEEPING UP

Although the pandemic has prompted temporary visitor restrictions at the Capitol, there are many ways for citizens to stay connected with the work of the Kentucky General Assembly. The General Assembly's website, legislature.ky.gov, allows you to:

- View agendas and informational materials on topics being considered by committees.

Livestreams of legislative action can be viewed through feeds provided by Kentucky Educational Television (KET) and the Legislative Research Commission (LRC.) In recent months, LRC has made significant tech upgrades in committee rooms to improve livestreams for those viewing meetings remotely. KET livestreams all chamber proceedings and many committee meetings. Any meetings not covered by KET are livestreamed by LRC.
