LEGISLATIVE UPDATE!

HB267: Constables

Filed by Rep. Adam Koenig, R-Erlanger, and House Democratic Floor Leader Joni Jenkins, D-Louisville, the bill would curtail and eliminate law enforcement and other powers and duties from constables. **Support**

HB267 is scheduled to be heard Wednesday, Feb. 17, at noon by the House Local Government Committee. Please review the <u>committee members</u>. If your House member is on the committee, call him or her and ask that they please support HB267. Legislators can be reached by calling 502-564-8100. Following are some quick points to make about the bill:

- HB267 does not eliminate the position of constable, but it does remove the peace officers powers of untrained constables.
- Untrained constables endanger public safety and can cost local governments money when their actions result in legal fees and lawsuits.
- There are close to 500 constables with guns and badges in Kentucky. They can make a traffic stop, issue a fine and even make an arrest. Despite this broad power, constables are not required to meet any of the Peace Officer Professional Standards (POPS) that are required of other law enforcement.
- The bill gives constables an opportunity to receive training by allowing constables to apply to any KLEC certified basic training course and by requiring DOCJT to accept at least one constable a year.
- By ensuring that constables are trained law enforcement personnel, we will better protect the public and the community.

LEGISLATIONKACP IS WATCHING

<u>HB265</u>: Sheriffs' tax settlements

Sponsored by Mary Beth Imes, R-Murray, and Rep. John Blanton, R-Salyersville, the bill would require the annual sheriff's tax settlement audit to be one audit for the period Sept. 1 to Aug. 31 including specific taxes and every type of tax for which a collection schedule has been completed, delinquent tax claims have been filed and settlements have been prepared. Passed House Local Government Committee; awaiting action by the full House. **Support**

HB513: Sheriffs fees

Sponsored by Rep. Michael Meredith, R-Oakland, the bill would create a new section of KRS Chapter 70 to require any local government placing any fee, tax or license on the property tax bill shall negotiate a collection fee of up to 4.25% for any sheriff collecting this fee, tax or license. Assigned to Local Government Committee. **Support**

<u>SB132</u>: Relates to the sale of confiscated firearms

Sponsored by Sen. Tom Buford, R-Nicholasville, would establish the Law Enforcement Protection Program, prioritize purchase of individual first aid kits through the program, and authorize the Kentucky Office of Homeland Security to use the proceeds of firearms sales to cover departmental costs of administering the program. There are concerns that the legislation would reduce grant funding to local departments. Assigned to Veterans, Military Affairs & Public Protection. **Monitoring.**

<u>SB159</u>: Relates to the Kentucky Community Crisis Response Board

Sponsored by Sen. Adrienne Southworth, R-Lawrenceburg. KACP has raised concerns about how the bill may impact the Crisis Response Board. The Frankfort team is meeting with Sen. Southworth this coming week. Not yet assigned to committee. Assigned to Veterans, Military Affairs & Public Protection. **Monitoring**

<u>SB180</u>: Relates to Commercial Mobile Radio Service Board (CMRS) funding

Sponsored by Sen. Jimmy Higdon, R-Lebanon, the bill proposes changes in how CMRS funding is allocated. Assigned to Senate Appropriations and Revenue Committee.

MIDWAY THROUGH THE SESSION

The General Assembly was not in session Monday due to the Presidents' Day Holiday and will not meet Tuesday, Feb. 16, because of weather conditions. Wednesday, Feb. 17, will mark the 15th day of the 30-day legislative session.

LEGISLATION UPDATE

HOUSE

HB21: Breonna's law

Sponsored by Rep. Attica Scott, D-Louisville, the bill is an omnibus law enforcement reform bill that includes no knock warrants, body cam regulations and more. Not yet assigned to committee. **Neutral**.

<u>HB120</u>: Fire mergers/tax collection fees

Sponsored by Rep. Ed Massey, R-Hebron, the bill was filed to allow fire departments in Boone County merge, though under the bill departments in other parts of the state could use it as well to merge. Not yet assigned to committee. **Monitoring**

HB136: Medical cannabis

Sponsored by Rep. Jason Nemes, R-Louisville, allows for the use of and regulates medical cannabis. Not het assigned to committee. **Monitoring**

HB138: Vehicle cosmetic damage; fee collection

Sponsored by Rep. Myron Dossett, R-Pembroke, the bill deals with "cosmetic damage" titles for motor vehicles that have received cosmetic damage only. A person seeking to have a title of a vehicle branded for having cosmetic damage only - such as from hail - shall have the vehicle inspected by the local sheriff. They shall submit to the sheriff a statement from the person's insurance company documenting that the cosmetic damage exceeds 75% of the retail value of the vehicle and that the damage is solely the result of hail or other cosmetic only damage. Upon completion of the inspection, the sheriff shall

certify on a vehicle transaction record that he or she has received the statement from the person's insurance company, that the damage to the vehicle is the result of hail or other cosmetic damage and if the total estimated or actual cost of parts and labor to rebuild or reconstruct the vehicle to its pre-cosmetic damage condition exceeds 75% of the retail value of the vehicle. The sheriff shall be paid a fee of \$5 to conduct the inspection. Assigned to Banking & Insurance Committee. Neutral

HB139: Line of duty benefit increase

Sponsored by Rep. John Blanton, the bill increases line of duty-related disability benefits. Not yet assigned to committee. **Support**

HB164: Increases penalties for crimes against law enforcement officers Sponsored by Rep. Regina Huff, R-Williamsburg, the bill creates a mandatory fine of \$5,000 for a person convicted of intentionally causing a peace officer to come into contact with communicable body fluid. Not yet assigned to committee. Monitoring

HB189: School bus safety

Sponsored by Rep. David Hale, R-Wellington, the bill allows counties to enact legislation permitting local school districts to purchase stop-arm cameras. The cameras capture stoparm violations by motorists and tag photos of the incident with details such as date, time and GPS coordinates that can be referred to law enforcement. Assigned to House

Transportation Committee. Neutral

HB242: Prevents sanctuary cities

Sponsored by Rep. Lynn Bechler, R-Marion, the bill would forbid a local government from enacting or adopting sanctuary policies and prohibit those local governments that do so from receiving any money administered by a state agency or department until any such policy is repealed or no longer in effect. Not yet assigned to committee. Monitoring

HB252: Pension income exclusion

Sponsored by Rep. Regina Huff, R-Williamsburg, the bill would increase the pension income exclusion from \$31,110 to \$41,110, retroactive for taxable years after Jan. 1, 2018. Not yet assigned to committee. Support

SENATE

SB 80 The "Decert" bill

Sponsored by Sen. Danny Carroll, R-Paducah, the bill has been assigned to the Senate Veterans, Military Affairs and Public Protection Committee. The bill strengthens Kentucky's decertification process for law enforcement officers. Rep. John Blanton, R-

Salversville, also a retired law enforcement officer, will help carry the bill in the House. Passed 28-0 in the Senate. Awaiting action in the House. Support

SB92: Medical cannabis

Sponsored by Sen. Stephen West, R-Paris, allows for the use of and regulates medical cannabis. Not yet assigned to committee. Monitoring

SB104: Constable training

Filed by Sen. Robby Mills, R-Henderson, the bill establishes training and certification for constables. Not yet assigned to committee. Monitoring

KEEPING UP
