SINE DIE!

KSA KENTUCKY GENERAL ASSEMBLY FINAL LEGISLATIVE REPORT FOR 2023 SESSION

Late on the evening of March 30, lawmakers in Frankfort declared Sine Die – the Latin phrase meaning "without day" that marks the close of the legislative session – to adjourn the Kentucky General Assembly's 2023 legislative session. Following is the final KSA legislative report.

KSA PRIORITES

HB5, bourbon tax exemption

Filed by Rep. Jason Petrie, R-Elkton, the chairman of the House Appropriations and Revenue (A&R) Committee and House Speaker David Osborne, R-Prospect, the bill allows an exemption of the property tax on distilled spirits stored or aging in barrels. **SIGNED INTO LAW BY THE GOVERNOR**

HB64, Police officer certification

Sponsored by Reps. Myron Dossett, R-Pembroke, Wade Wilson, R-Earlington - the retired chief of Madisonville - extend the period of time that a peace officer, who was employed as a peace officer as of December 1, 1998, may be separated from service before losing his or her certification status from 100 days to 365 days. **AWAITING TO BE SIGNED INTO LAW BY THE GOVERNOR**

HB373, related to peace officer certification

Filed by Rep. John Blanton, R-Salyersville, the bill removes court security officers from the list of officers required to be KLEC certified; allows KLEC to certify local alcoholic beverage control investigators appointed before April, 2019; allow an officer who has been on inactive status for less than one year to return to certification status with no additional training requirements; other provisions. **AWAITING TO BE SIGNED INTO LAW BY THE GOVERNOR**

HB380, lower age for new hires entering the academy

Filed by Rep. Susan Witten, R-Louisville, the bill allows a person who is at least 20 years old to be hired by a law enforcement agency to attend basic training if the person will be 21 years old at the time they become certified; require KLEC to allow person who is 20 years old to attend basic training if the person will be 21 years old by the conclusion of basic training. **SIGNED INTO LAW BY THE GOVERNOR.**

SB101, employment contracts

Sponsored by Sen. Johnnie Turner, R-Harlan, the legislation extends contracts subject to reimbursement for training costs to five years for law enforcement officers, including sheriff's deputies and officers working for state universities and airports. **SIGNED INTO LAW BY THE GOVERNOR**

<u>HB506</u>, related to post-retirement options for state and local employees and is designed to help keep experienced employees in the workforce

Filed by Rep. Walker Thomas, R-Hopkinsville, and Rep. D.J. Johnson, Owensboro, the will pertains to participants in the CERS, KERS, and State Police Retirement System and gives retires the option to receive a single payment upon retirement equal to 12, 24, 36, 48 or 60 months of benefits – also known as a Partial Lump-Sum Option (PLSO). Other provisions include:

- The employee's subsequent monthly payments would be reduced appropriately.
- Kentucky Public Pensions Authority (KPPA) would provide an online calculator to show members how many additional months of service would be required to make up the difference in their monthly checks caused by the PLSO payment.
- KPPA would also provide information on the PLSO option, including benefits, consequences and tax implications.
- To put retirees back to work, the required break before reemployment would be reduced from three months to one.
- The bill pertains to hazardous and nonhazardous.
- The employee and employer would still certify there was no prearranged agreement.

SIGNED INTO LAW BY THE GOVERNOR

HB540, related to SRO's

Filed by Rep. Killian Timoney, R-Lexington, the bill allows private and parochial schools to enter memorandums of understanding with local law enforcement agencies to provide SROs. **Passed by both chambers; awaiting governor's signature to become law.**

LEGISLATION KSA FOLLOWING

HOUSE

HB150, related to motor vehicle dealers

Sponsored by Ken Upchurch, R-Monticello, the legislation proposes several changes to statues regarding motor vehicle dealers, including successor plans; allowing a manufacturer to audit a motor dealer in the manufacturer reasonably suspects fraud; increase the time allowed for a dealer to respond to notice of cancellation from 15 days to 30 days; the dealer's relationship with manufacturers' requirements; and more. **SIGNED INTO LAW BY THE GOVERNOR**

<u>HB153</u>, related to prohibiting the enforcement of a federal ban or regulation of firearms.

Filed by Rep. Josh Bray, R-Mt. Vernon, the bill prohibits law enforcement from enforcing federal firearms bans, such as the AFT rule on stabilization braces that converts pistols into rifles. The legislation also declares Kentucky as a Second Amendment sanctuary state. **BECAME LAW WITHOUT GOVERNOR'S SIGNATURE**

HB157, search and rescue

Filed by Rep. Mark Hart, R-Falmouth, the bill would create the Kentucky Urban Search and Rescue Program under the Division of Emergency Management. **SIGNED INTO LAW BY THE GOVERNOR**

HB207, wellness programs, Early Intervention System, internal communications Sponsored by Rep. Kevin Bratcher, R-Louisville, the legislation would allow law enforcement departments to create a wellness program featuring an Early Intervention System (EIS). An EIS allows an officer to seek and receive confidential counseling and other services and treatment and the information revealed by the officer would, in most cases, not be subject to the Open Records law and could not be used in court proceedings. AWAITING TO BE SIGNED INTO LAW BY THE GOVERNOR

HB217, salvage titles-tilting of motor vehicles

Sponsored by Rep. Michael Meredith, R-Oakland, the legislation would include the application for salvage titles under the electronic title application and registration system. **SIGNED INTO LAW BY THE GOVERNOR**

HB236, fiduciary duties owed to the-administered retirement systems

Filed by Rep. Scott Sharp, R-Ashland, the bill provide that fiduciaries shall consider the sole interest of the members and beneficiaries of the retirement systems using only pecuniary/monetary factors and prohibit the consideration of or actions on nonpecuniary interests including environmental, social, political and ideological interests. **SIGNED INTO LAW BY THE GOVERNOR**

SENATE

SB89, urban county government law enforcement officers

Filed by Sen. Donald Douglas, R-Lexington, allows urban-county governments (Lexington) to reemploy police officers who have retired from the urban-county government police. **SIGNED INTO LAW BY THE GOVERNOR**

SB199, related to motor vehicle track devices

Filed by Sen. Rick Girdler, R-Somerset, the legislation would make it illegal to use tracking devices on motor vehicles without the consent of the owner or lessee. **SIGNED**

INTO LAW BY THE GOVERNOR

SB228, related to driving under the influence of marijuana

Filed by Sen. Johnnie Turner, R-Harlan, the legislation would create a per se limit for a blood level of driving under the influence of marijuana. **BILL DIED WITHOUT FULL ACTION SENATE.**

OTHER BILLS OF INTEREST

Nearly 176 bills were passed during the 30-day session – including more than 40 on the last day of the session.

After being debated for the last several sessions, medicinal cannabis was passed. SB 47 allows cannabis for people suffering cancer, chronic and other types of pain, epilepsy, multiple sclerosis, muscle spasms, chronic nausea or post-traumatic stress disorder. Patients over 21 could vape, but smoking marijuana would remain illegal. The Cabinet for Health and Family Services will now establish to oversee and regulate the program, scheduled to start in January 2025.

Another bill that has been in front of legislators for several years – sports wagering – also passed. HB551 creates a structure to legalize, regulate and tax sports wagering. The Kentucky Horse Racing Commission will regulate the program. Only licensed tracks would be permitted to obtain a sports wagering license and operate a brick and mortar sports book. Online wagering will also be permitted. The bill is expected to raise about \$23 million annually for the general funds.
